
St Julian's School Prospectus 2024

St Julian's is a thriving, popular and oversubscribed 11-18 secondary school situated in Newport, South Wales with a population of 1500 students. Situated between the centre of Newport and more rural areas of our city, our catchment brings together students from many different communities: a diversity we are exceptionally proud of.

The majority of our students come from four primary schools – Glan Usk, St Julian's, Eveswell and Maindee Primary Schools. A substantial number also transfer from about ten other primary schools from across the city.

PROGRESS

At St Julian's School we are very proud of the support systems that we have in place for our students to ensure that obstacles to learning are understood, supported and overcome. Each year group has a Progress Leader to support the students.





Progress Leaders closely monitor their students' academic achievement, attitude to learning (behaviour) and emotional wellbeing. Whilst behaviour and wellbeing are monitored daily via ClassCharts and SIMS attendance register, we capture academic data and report home to parents and carers termly.

These reports share information on students' performance in all subjects: the progress they are making and their attitude to learning (punctuality, effort and engagement and respect and behaviour). One of these reports will also contain a detailed subject report with improvement targets.

When monitoring progress for students in KS3, levels are being replaced with four Progress in Learning scores (1 - 4: excellent. good, satisfactory and little progress). These scores determine how well students have retained and can apply new knowledge and skills to date. All students have a target of making excellent / good progress. Progress in literacy and numeracy skills is gauged through the scores determined by the English and maths department alongside Cognitive Ability Tests (CATs) which are taken at the start, middle and end of the key stage.

At Key Stage 4 & 5, students are given a target grade to achieve for each subject and progress is monitored via staff awarding professional predictions at each termly data capture.

When a student is identified as underachieving, appropriate support and intervention is put into place depending on specific needs. This is monitored by the Progress Leader and Head of Department.

STUDENT SUPPORT



Student Reception is the focal point for student queries throughout the school day. Student Reception handles a number of functions which include:

- Student timetables
- Uniform
- Lost property
- Stationary and other school equipment
- First Aid Point

Students who feel unwell or have an accident are to be directed to Student Reception. Unwell students must not leave school or be sent home without the school's first aider's authorisation.

Parents/carers will be asked to collect the child and will sign out at Main Reception. In the case of minor accidents, the first aider on duty will take the necessary measures and record the accident on the accident log. In the case of potentially serious accidents, one of our qualified first aiders will go to the student. If in doubt, a member of staff will dial 999 and request an ambulance and parents will be notified.

Student Support Centre (SSC)

Our Student Support Team work with many of our students to remove any barriers to learning. Along with dealing with behavioural incidents, they also provide emotional support for a range of issues which include bereavement, anger management, mental health issues, self-harm and friendship problems.

Our Student Support Team, led by Mrs Payne, work with students who require a bespoke form of support in order to keep them engaged in their learning. This may include students who have been absent from school for periods of time or students who are struggling to make progress over a number of subjects. Their role is vital to ensure that all students leave St Julian's with formal qualifications.

Our Student Support Centre is available for any students that need help with learning, wellbeing and attitudes.

CWTCH

The 'CWTCH' is a new area to our school designed to support the mental health and wellbeing of our learners. Mrs Paske, Mrs Griffiths and Miss Andersen have worked hard to create a safe and welcoming space to help support students with their social and emotional needs.

Mrs Griffiths and Miss Andersen provide support on a 1-1 or small group setting: working with pupils to overcome learning barriers. They are also able to offer support to pupils not working to a normal timetable and support them in completing coursework and controlled assessments. They also provide individual guidance and coaching, helping pupils to develop study skills, revision strategies and exam preparation.

Learning Development Centre & Additional Learning Needs



LDC

The Learning Development Centre is Newport's resource base for students with a statement for special educational needs.

The LDC has 60 places; 12 in each year group from Year 7 to Year 11. Students are taught a range of subjects by 5 specialist teachers supported by 10 Teaching Assistants. Their adapted curriculum includes Literacy and Numeracy alongside mainstream subjects.

The LDC is very much a part of St Julian's School. All students are in houses, take part in extracurricular events and visits and are represented on the Student Council.

Our LDC students are valued members of our school community.

ALN

Our school's ALNCo is Mrs H Hopkins, Assistant Headteacher.

Mrs Hopkins is responsible for overseeing the ALN provision within our school, including our Learning Support and Learning Development Centre (LDC) departments.

The Learning Support Team work with a wide spectrum of ALN students who need additional help on their journey through school. Not only supporting students in lessons, they also deliver interventions to boost literacy and numeracy levels; run social skills groups and provide wrap around care for a number of our students who come from across Newport to benefit from the best inclusion services in the city.

The team, consisting of 27 Teaching Assistants, is managed by Mrs Martin and Mrs Cox.



SCHOOL EXPECTATIONS

At St Julian's we aim to always set high standards and clearly communicate our expectations of conduct around the school. Our expectations are displayed in every classroom, providing a clear and consistent message for all.

Equally, we aim to reward all students who follow rules consistently and show them how important they are to the smooth running of the school. We arrange a termly award event to reward students with high attendance, positive attitudes towards learning, excellent behaviour and punctuality.
